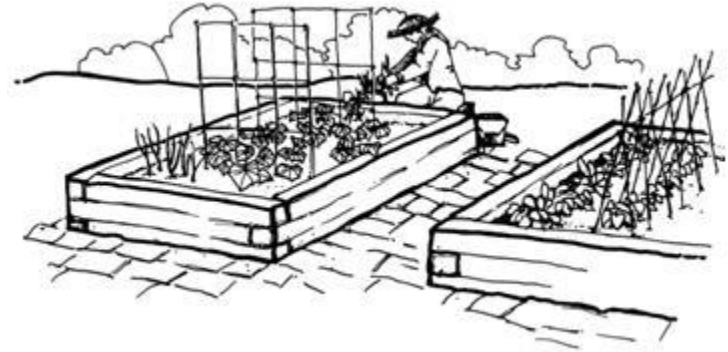
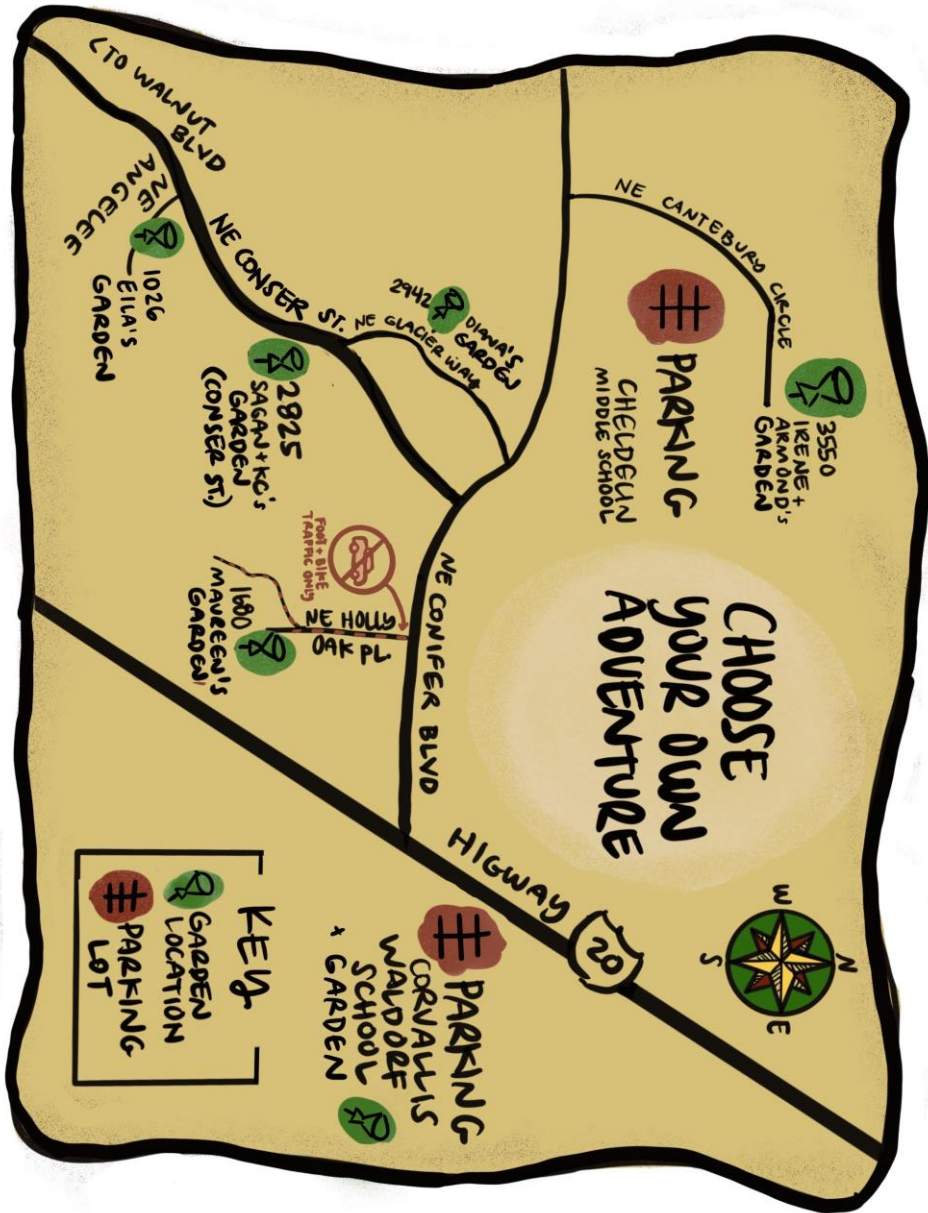


Edible Garden Tour

2942 NE Glacier Way

Comments: Gardening is our act of rebellion. Four years ago, we set out to transform our garden from a patch of poplar trees, dirt, and weeds, to a peaceful park-like atmosphere full of wildlife. Our garden features annuals, perennials, dry farming techniques, water catchment, solar panels to power our wildlife-deterring fence and disaster preparedness, and a solar oven. Comments: Our school garden, greenhouse, apple orchard, dry-farmed field, native plant gardens, and forest are managed through our Agricultural Arts Program, which serves 150 students in grades 1-8. The garden includes annual vegetables, perennial fruits, culinary and medicinal herbs, dye and fiber plants, nitrogen-fixing shrubs, and native plants. Our greenhouse has vegetables, tropical perennials, and a rainwater harvesting system.
