Portable bike racks are available to borrow in Corvallis!

The City of Corvallis has 27 ten-foot-long portable bike racks available for the Corvallis community to borrow. Each rack has space for at least 14 bikes (7 on each side).

The bike racks can be transported by truck, or stacks of 3-4 racks can be hauled by bicycle on specially designed trailers that attach to rear bike racks with a hitch.

The bike racks and trailers are stored at Corvallis Public Works and can be reserved online via the Public Works Bike Parking webpage:

The dimensions of one bike rack are 10' long, 44" wide, by 36" high.

In addition to the racks, there are five trailers. To transport racks by bicycle, a base rack with a coupler (4 available) is set on a trailer. The coupler fits on a hitch that is temporarily bolted to a rear bicycle rack.
